Jolene Zigarovich is associate professor of English in the Department of Languages & Literatures at the University of Northern Iowa. She is the author of *Writing Death and Absence in the Victorian Novel: Engraved Narratives*, and she is editor of *Sex and Death in Eighteenth-Century Literature as* well as *TransGothic in Literature and Culture*. Her monograph *Death and the Body in the Eighteenth-Century Novel* had the support of the National Endowment for the Humanities and is forthcoming in 2022 at the University of Pennsylvania Press. In spring 2021 she was a visiting research fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies in the Humanities, University of Edinburgh and is currently an individual fellow for the academic year at the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study, Amsterdam. These fellowships are in support of her book project, *Necropolitics: Legislating the Dead Body and the Victorian Novel*, which considers the posthumous life of characters uncannily bound by regulation. Her VISAWUS talk stems from her work on sexually diverse and non-binary bodies in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, essays that will be forthcoming in 2022, as well as her continued interest in trans studies and their interplay with narrative.



3:30-4:00 Scholarly Musings

Based on work for her recent edited anthology, *Victorian Artists' Autograph Replicas: Auras, Aesthetics, Patronage and the Art Market* (Routledge, 2020), Julie Codell will discuss another aspect of her current research, the changing status of Victorian art collectors, how private collectors became culture heroes in the late nineteenth century, with a focus on the case study of F. G. Stephens's 90+ articles written from 1873 to 1887 on private collectors for the *Athenaeum*. She will then show how collectors transitioned to become national culture heroes and how the press served to crown them through Victorian art criticism.

10:30-11:00 Scholarly Musings

Warrior Generation examines the role of militarism in lower class boys' culture of the 1865-1885 generation. Richard Fulton studied key contexts of how boys lived their lives—family, school, work, play and leisure—and concluded that while lower class boys' lives were rife with conflict, and good fighters were generally respected and admired, none of that respect transformed into either respect or admiration for the military. Regular Middle Class schemes to enhance army recruitment by imposing militaristic attitudes and values on boys failed through the last 30 years of the nineteenth century. In his Musings session, Richard will discuss lower class schools, schooling, and attempts to militarize boys through curriculum and activities.


